We are a financial services group listed on the Namibia Stock Exchange ("NSX"). As a Group, we are a Namibian company with operations in Namibia and Botswana. This includes our banking businesses Bank Windhoek and Bank Gaborone, and our other financial service providers Capricorn Asset Management ("CAM") and Entrepo.

While the Capricorn Foundation is the main driver of our CSR initiatives across the Group, each subsidiary also supports and facilitates its own projects.

Our approach to CSR

The Capricorn Group CSR Policy informs decisions and actions applicable to the Capricorn Foundation and all other corporate social responsibility initiatives within the Group and its subsidiaries. The policy outlines our CSR vision, philosophy, principles, and social investment areas, and includes a framework for managing all CSR activities throughout Capricorn Group.

We invest in various social and community-based projects in Namibia and Botswana that seek to positively change the lives of vulnerable communities. These are the aspects that our subsidiaries need to factor in when identifying CSR initiatives to assist:

The plan aims to address Namibia's most pressing challenges through initiatives under five pillars:

Leadership messages

Message from the Chairperson

As a corporate leader, we must challenge our relevance to stakeholders and continuously re-evaluate how we make an impact.

I am pleased to present the second Capricorn Group social value report. This report encapsulates the CSR efforts of the Group and its subsidiaries and the meaningful contribution that we make through the work of the Foundation.

From facilitating the e-learning experience for children in remote areas of Namibia to employees donating textbooks and stationery to vulnerable learners, our CSR initiatives reflect our determination to be Connectors of Positive Change.

Since the Foundation's inception in February 2020, it has acted as a driver of the Group's CSR vision and has identified key focus areas that will enable us to have a positive impact on people, including early childhood development ("ECD"), quality education, food security and job creation.

Propelling economic advancement

Creating employment and entrepreneurship opportunities is not the task of the government and public sector institutions alone. As the private sector, we have a crucial role in spurring economic growth and development. We are a strong advocate for collaboration, and during the past year, we experienced the power of likeminded organisations from various sectors working together to find solutions for common problems. There is ample opportunity for even more collaboration to address the social challenges we experience in Namibia and Botswana.

One of these social challenges is unemployment. The biggest unemployed demographic in Namibia is the youth, with potential ramifications for social stability. As Capricorn Group, we are determined to identify channels for economic enhancement and job creation, such as vocational training programmes and skills development initiatives that will improve the economic prospects of young people.

The Capricorn Foundation in 2023

Over the last year, the Capricorn Foundation supported and facilitated 32 projects while collaborating with the Group's subsidiaries, external partners, non-profit organisations and government institutions. The Foundation has excellent governance processes in place. We are committed to delving deeper into the SDGs that we have identified as a priority for the Group. The Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge is the first signature project of the Foundation and has been hugely effective in creating broad awareness on the issue of food waste that contributes to food insecurity. Through the open innovation challenge, excellent ideas were offered on how to address food waste. The Foundation continues to search for more signature projects that will significantly impact our communities. We also want to expand our sources of funding for our projects beyond the Group and its subsidiaries.

A note of appreciation

I acknowledge the Group, subsidiary and Foundation boards for their commitment to our CSR activities. We are grateful to our numerous partners who continue to collaborate with us on our purpose to be Connectors of Positive Change in the communities where we operate. I also wish to thank the hundreds of Capricorn employees, who in their role as Changemakers, continue to dedicate their time and personal resources, to positively impact the lives of others.

Message From Capricorn Foundation Executive Officer

The Foundation has made many strides forward since its launch in 2020. In 2023, we dedicated our time and resources towards building networks and enhancing stakeholder engagement.

The year in review

In its third year, the Foundation expanded its reach across the regions of Namibia, growing our list of beneficiaries and initiatives within our selected focus areas. We also took on our very first signature project, the Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge, which has enabled us to address the food security crisis in the country.

The work we do is more than just about signing a cheque. We consider the Namibian CSR landscape to understand the key role players, what socioeconomic challenges are being addressed and where we can work and collaborate with partners. The Foundation is seen as a thought leader that is open to collaboration, and we want to reinforce this by fostering new networks within the private and public sectors.

To strengthen our network and stakeholder engagement, we have actively engaged with other foundations and non-profit organisations and government institutions. This includes the United Nations World Food Programme ("WFP"), the European Union, DeBeers Namdeb Foundation and Namibia's Ministries of Education, Gender, and Health and Social Services, to name a few. We also engaged with mining company B2Gold Namibia's foundation to discuss possible collaborations on some of their projects.

While we continue to invest in ECD, we are also considering training opportunities for the youth. Namibia has one of the highest unemployment rates in southern Africa, which could be alleviated through vocational training. Such training will enable young people to learn vocational skills such as plumbing, coding, hospitality and tourism. We have engaged other foundations and NGOs to understand what is needed to develop the vocational training landscape. Many young people who complete high school cannot pursue tertiary education or find jobs. On the other hand, graduates struggle to secure employment and could benefit from vocational training programmes.

Online learning remains a key focus for the Foundation, and we are proud of our partnership with EduVision to ensure that children in remote areas have access to the necessary resources.

With the growth of the Foundation, we appointed Veripura Muukua as a coordinator. With a full-time resource focused on facilitating the Foundation's projects, we have been able to reach more beneficiaries and take on more projects.

Championing food security

According to the WFP's 2022 Global Hunger Index, Namibia suffers from a serious level of hunger, ranking 78^{th} out of 116 countries. Malnutrition is a growing concern, with 24% of children under the age of five stunted (reduced growth relative to age), 6% experiencing wasting (weighing too little for their height) and 13% underweight.

Food security has been a crucial focus for the Foundation over the last year. We believe that several other challenges will be addressed if we can solve food insecurity. Together with the World Food Programme Namibia, we hosted a 'Transformative Food Systems Workshop', which brought together various stakeholders to share knowledge and best practices on enhancing food and nutritional security.

Our first signature project, The Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge, was officially launched in July 2022. Phase one of the Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge was successfully concluded in October 2022. Phase two of the Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge concluded in July 2023 and encouraged the public to think out of the box and present innovative solutions to combat food waste. Contestants had to present ideas under the theme: "How can we use social entrepreneurship to radically reduce food waste while also creating employment opportunities?"

Looking ahead

While the Capricorn Foundation remains the anchor for all Capricorn Group's CSR initiatives, we are working towards guiding Bank Gaborone to enhance its CSR and execute its own initiatives and projects across Botswana. We are also reviewing the kind of impact we want to have in society; this requires us to re-look at our portfolio and identify signature projects while still supporting our legacy projects.

The Capricorn Foundation has well-defined objectives that are aligned with our priority SDGs. Looking forward, we want to assess our priority SDGs and identify tangible targets that we can set for each goal. We have a long way to go, and we understand that there is more to learn as it relates to implementing SDGs. That is why we have approached the UN to receive training that will enable us to execute our SDG-linked targets.

Appreciation

I wish to thank the boards of Capricorn Group, Bank Windhoek, CAM and Entrepo for enabling us, through their financial and in-kind support, to continue making a difference in the lives of so many people. I also express my gratitude to the Foundation's incredible management committee and the dedicated board for their support and commitment. We acknowledge our new and longstanding partners and beneficiary organisations and look forward to continued collaboration to make a positive impact on society.

Creating value and impacting lives


We are a socially responsible Group that is strongly obliged to its stakeholders. In keeping with our brand promise of being Connectors of Positive Change, we take pride in the value we create through our CSR initiatives, by positively impacting lives.

Through the Group's CSR initiatives, including the Foundation and subsidiaries, we have invested N\$21,7 million (2022: N\$16,3 million) in social responsibility efforts in Namibia and Botswana. Below is a breakdown of the investments by the Foundation, Group and subsidiaries in CSR. This excludes any salary costs of employees in the Group, Foundation or subsidiaries.

The Capricorn Foundation

Over the last three years, the Foundation has been committed to strengthening corporate social responsibility in Namibia through initiating and promoting collaboration among its beneficiaries and likeminded organisations, thereby impacting more lives.

1. The Foundation's vision

The Capricorn Foundation vision statement is aligned with the Group's CSR vision.

The Capricorn Foundation aspires to be a Connector of Positive Change by being accountable to ourselves and our stakeholders. We seek to make an overall positive economic and social impact on society by responsibly investing in sustainable programmes that address national priorities in line with the SDGs.

2. What we do

The Foundation's main aim is to identify and fund programmes, projects or organisations that need support to impact local communities positively. We want to:

- > Act as the main vehicle through which the Group manages its CSR activities in Namibia
- > Solicit funds from other donor companies, individuals and organisations which share our vision
- > Seek collaboration and partnerships between the programmes, projects or organisations supported by the organisation to achieve greater impact and consolidation of efforts
- > Provide financial and non-financial (in-kind) support to identified projects, programmes, or organisations
- > Implement and maintain a well-defined process for monitoring and evaluating the progress and impact of our support

3. What we want to achieve

The Foundation seeks to support the Group's CSR vision, definition, and philosophy through the central coordination of CSR activities. We aim to achieve the following objectives:

- > Live up to the Group's purpose of being "Connectors of Positive Change"
- > Move away from charitable and ad-hoc corporate social investment ("CSI") to create meaningful value for society
- > Run the Foundation on the principles of sustainability
- > Improve the measurement of and reporting on the impact of our projects
- > Align our CSR closer to our business model and competencies
- > Partner with like-minded foundations and institutions to address national concerns
- > Actively engage our stakeholders to identify community needs

4. Key focus areas

The Capricorn Foundation has five key focus areas, divided into primary and supplementary areas:

Education and training



Economic advancement, with a focus on job creation and entrepreneurial skills development

Supplementary focus areas



Vulnerability: basic needs of vulnerable groups, especially children (hunger and poverty) and gender-based violence ("GBV") victim counselling



Health, especially major dread diseases, mental health, and disability



Sustainability programmes contributing to the attainment of the UN's SDGs



5. Stakeholder engagement

Between July 2022 and June 2023, the Foundation collaborated with various stakeholders and participated in stakeholder initiatives across Namibia. Below are some of the events we have hosted and/or supported this financial year:

Corporate social investment conference: Maximising Social Impact

In February 2023, Namibian-owned fundraising platform, Charitree, hosted a one-day conference, titled 'Maximising Social Impact'. Charitree aims to sustain and grow registered Namibian charities by connecting them to donors and sponsors.

The event discussed the importance of collaboration, understanding the current CSR landscape in Namibia and the key role players. Veripura Muukua, Capricorn Foundation Coordinator, presented on the Capricorn Foundation's efforts within the communities.

Capricorn Foundation Food Security Workshop

In March 2023, The Capricorn Foundation hosted a one-day hybrid workshop on 'Transformative Food Systems for Sustainable Development' in collaboration with the United Nations World Food Programme ("WFP").

The Capricorn Foundation and the WFP share a common vision where every person has access to sufficient and nutritious food and where food systems are sustainable and resilient. The workshop was attended by 70 key role players in the private and public sectors to create awareness around transformative food systems in Namibia and their role in achieving sustainable livelihoods, socioeconomic development and national food and nutrition security.

Food systems are critical to achieving long-term food and nutrition security, environmental sustainability, climate change adaptation and mitigation, job creation and rural livelihood transformation. As the current food systems in Namibia face challenges in achieving the above goals, engaging and seeking various pathways toward transforming food systems in Namibia to upscale local food production and achieve sustainable development was pivotal.

Namibia Institute of Corporate Governance Conference


In March 2023, the Namibia Institute of Corporate Governance partnered with Capricorn Group, the Ministry of Finance and Public Enterprise, the Ministry of Mines and Energy and the Office of the President to bring together like-minded corporate governance professionals and thought leaders from corporate Namibia to network at the institutes in Windhoek.

The conference enabled corporate governance professionals to share skills, learnings, and practices and compare experiences to encourage an improved corporate governance culture in Namibia. The conference was attended by more than 100 representatives from government, business and civil society.

At the conference, Capricorn Foundation coordinator Veripura Muukua spoke on the role of private enterprise and civil society in CSR.




Our funding model

The Capricorn Foundation receives financial support from the Group and Namibia-based subsidiaries – Bank Windhoek, Entrepo and CAM, including Capricorn Unit Trust Management Company. The Group contributes to the Foundation by paying the salaries of the executive officer and Capricorn Foundation Coordinator and providing additional administrative support through its various departments.

The Foundation received a contribution of 0.85% of the preceding year's profit after tax ("PAT") from Bank Windhoek and Capricorn Asset Management, including Capricorn Unit Trust Management Company, and 0.555% PAT from Entrepo, to the value of N\$8,576,952 million (2022: N\$7,737,500). A total of N\$586,296 was received from interest mainly through an investment at Capricorn Asset Management. The Foundation allocated N\$9,042,164 to projects and programmes across primary and supplementary focus areas. Unspent funds will roll over to the new financial year to fund new applications.

Education and training

Education is one of the primary focus areas for Capricorn Foundation, in line with our vision of creating meaningful value in our communities. In 2023, we supported eight education-related initiatives in Namibia, particularly on ECD.

Many Namibian children, especially in remote areas, between the ages of five and six, cannot access pre-primary programmes. Amos Meerkat Syllabus, a Christian curriculum and training programme, seeks to address this challenge.

Teachers receive training through the programme to run small preschools for children on farms or informal settlements. The teachers are provided with appropriate curriculum and teaching aids. This includes easy-to-use material that empowers literate adults, including parents, to

In the last year, Amos Meerkat Syllabus focused on motivating and inspiring monitors through hosting three-weekend workshops. The project has also trained assistants. Through its partnership with the Nutrition and Food Security Alliance of Namibia ("NAFSAN"), the NGO addressed the need for nutritious meals for preschool children.

The programme hopes to train at least 20 new teachers in the next year, focusing on the south of Namibia, including areas such as Mariental, Keetmanshoop, Lüderitz, Caprivi-East (Divundu to Katima) and Opuwo. Since its launch in 2012, the project has reached around 5,000 preschool children across Namibia annually, from Lüderitz in the south to Katima Mulilo in the north.

The African Child Development Trust ("ACDT") seeks to address the social challenges related to education, including access to education, quality education, equity in education and socioeconomic development.

Children across Namibia have limited to no learning resources and materials, such as paper, worksheets and reading materials. ACDT runs an education project that addresses the lack of quality, affordable, accessible, and multilingual learning materials.

This educational project is a collaboration with the Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture ("MoEAC") and Namibia Media Holdings. The project focuses on designing, printing, and distributing quality-approved educational books to children across the country in various languages.

In 2023, the organisation focused on children in ECD centres, pre-primary schools, and the languages in most demand across Namibia.

Nine (9) languages, namely English, Afrikaans, Oshikwanyama, Oshindonga, Khoekhoegowab, Otjiherero, Rukwangali, Rumanyo and Silozi, were reached via print, with the following additional via website: German, Thimbukushu and Sign language. Children can also freely access the materials and lessons on the website.

Since the project started in 2020, ACDT has delivered over 12 million books to children across Namibia. It has reached over 900 schools and 600 ECD centres in all regions and has reached a total of 360,000 children, and on average 30,000 children per week.

The Foundation is one of the main financial partners of the ACDT.

LearnOnOne Education and Leadership Development, or simply "LearnOnOne", is a not-for-profit organisation launched during the COVID-19 lockdowns to bridge the digital divide by providing access to free, supplementary education through broadcast television.

 $Learn On One\ broadcasts\ extra\ classes\ for\ learners\ without\ access\ to\ supplementary\ education\ support\ and\ non-school\ content\ to\ help\ children.\ This\ includes\ the\ 21^{st}-century\ skills\ needed\ to\ succeed\ in\ the\ increasingly\ competitive\ job\ market.$

In April 2023, the Foundation officially handed over N\$100,000 to the LearnOnOne Project to broadcast grade 10 and 11 economics and science lessons from April 2023 to March 2024.

In 2023, LearnOnOne visited schools around Windhoek, Otjiwarongo and the Northern regions to create awareness about the platform and disseminate promotional material and timetables.

In 2024, LearnOnOne aims to branch into content creation to expand the variety of content available on the platform. More learner engagement and dialogue with teachers is another area that will continue to be a priority.

Thousands of children walk many kilometres barefooted to school and back in Namibia, leaving them susceptible to diseases and safety hazards. Launched in 2021, Project Never Walk Alone seeks to restore Namibian children's human dignity and confidence by providing them with school shoes, keeping them in school and improving their education.

With the support of the Capricorn Foundation, Project Never Walk Alone will hand over 350 pairs of shoes to children in the Hardap region. With funding to the Project in the previous financial year 2022-2023, the project in October 2022 donated shoes to 350 learners from Groot Aub Primary School and Chairman Mau Zedong High School in the Khomas region.

Over the last year, the project focused on intensifying its fundraising initiatives and set a target to deliver 10,000 pairs of shoes for 2024.

The Step out of Poverty through Education and Support ("SPES") Charity provides holistic assistance to informal preschools, helping them to develop into well-functioning and high-impact ECD facilities. This creates opportunities for children to reach their full potential. The project offers teacher-training, mentorship, meals and educational materials.

In 2023, SPES deepened its impact on all its four levels of involvement, namely intellectual, physical, emotional, and spiritual. This includes implementing a new practical for their day-to-day programme and expanding its mentorship and weekly training of teachers.

SPES also started a new Future Leaders Project to support specific children as they enter primary school.

Many children across Namibia live in poor conditions that limit their development and growth. Development Workshop Namibia ("DWN") aims to alleviate this risk to improve the early experiences of young children in informal settlements to break cycles of poverty and inequality and to give them the best possible chance in life. They do this through its "Play for All" programme.

DWN is implementing an ECD programme focusing on improving the quality of early stimulation, education, parenting, and play-based learning for ECD centres and children in informal settlements.

The Foundation partnered with the DWN Project for infrastructure support at the ECD centres including the construction of the centres, toilets, library boxes and playgrounds.

Digitisation has transformed the way children experience learning. EduVision provides remote schools with internet access to enable this kind of learning.

Founded in 2017, EduVision was created to provide quality education to learners in remote areas. The educational platform uses modern technology and e-learning to give students in rural communities access to the same educational opportunities as their urban counterparts. This goal is achieved through interactive e-learning and teaching mathematics, physics, chemistry, English, accounting and biology to grades 10 to 12.

The project in 2023 introduced grade 1 recorded lessons, including the necessary teaching aids. This programme is currently on trial at four schools in the Ohangwena region (three schools) and the Hardap region (one school). Two mobile studios, one in Windhoek and one in Otjiwarongo, were also supplied with all the necessary digital equipment for the recording of Grade 1 and English Grade 11 lessons, were installed.

With the help of the Foundation, EduVision has provided teacher training and workshops for blended teaching and learning, access to recorded lessons for learners, bandwidth and interactive live teaching from Edugate Academy teachers.

"The provision of a smart lab classroom has revolutionised the learning environment at our school. With access to the internet and educational resources, our students have gained valuable exposure to vast knowledge and information. This has resulted in enhanced research capabilities and improved learning outcomes."

The organisation seeks to break the cycle of poverty and HIV/AIDS by tackling each aspect of a child's developmental needs: educational, physical, spiritual and emotional, and providing solutions to address problems related to these needs.

Christ's Hope International provides holistic support through education and training, feeding schemes, medical evaluation, HIV Testing and Monitoring, AIDS awareness training, evangelism and discipleship, counselling and mentorship.

The organisation conducts regular school visits for all the children in its care and liaises with teachers on how best to support them. In providing holistic support, Christ's Hope International regularly meets with social workers to discuss and resolve issues around children that are facing abuse at home

Capricorn Foundation collaborated with Christ's Hope International to provide school supplies and uniforms and a Christmas celebration and gifts for children supported by the organisation. The Foundation also assisted the organisation in planting a community garden in Okahandja and contributed towards gap funding and a bursary for a second-year nursing student.

Namibia has one of the highest unemployment rates in the world, and projects such as Women at Work aim to address this social challenge.

Women at Work allows young people to learn basic cooking skills, how to clean a kitchen according to industrial kitchen standards, how to clean a room according to hospitality standards and doing laundry as in a hotel laundry set-up.

During the eight weeks, students are provided with life skills classes to equip them for the employment market. As part of the training, students spend two weeks on the field. Of the 56 students trained between July 2022 – June 2023, 10 students secured full-time employment and five found part-time employment. Two students were sent by their employers for full-time training, two students were sent by their employers for laundry classes, and one was sent for cleaning classes.

With financial support from the Foundation, the Women at Work Training Centre has prepared unemployed people for the labour force. Since many students cannot afford the N\$1,500 tuition fee, Women at Work, with the help of the Foundation, has provided financial assistance for its disadvantaged students.

In the year ahead, Women at Work hopes to place 80% of its students in employment, enrol more students, and set up a dressmaking training programme for ex-offenders.

Omba Arts Trust is a non-profit trust that supports the sustainable livelihoods and resilience of rural Namibian artisans through the development, sales and marketing of quality craft and San art.

The organisation supports artisan groups in nine regions and partners with key NGOs such as Nyae Development Foundation, Integrated Rural Development and Nature Conservation (IRDNC) and Desert Research Foundation. Omba sources and supplies raw materials, and places regular orders with artisan groups, develops marketable products, and applies the principles of fair trade. It also addresses emergencies such as crop failure due to drought and supports artisans accordingly.

The Foundation has supported the Trust to cover operational costs for five remote San communities.

In 2023, Omba Arts Trust reported the following increase in income for artisans within its regions:

- > Drimiopsis (Omaheke region): 53%
- > San Alive (Omaheke region): 58%
- > Bwabwata (Zambezi region): 72%
- > Ekoka (Ohangwena region): 62%

In April 2023, Omba was invited to submit artworks from the Drimiopsis San Resettlement group to an exhibition called "Unmourned Bodies" at the Arts Association Gallery in Cape Town. Beaded artworks from this group were also used as wallpaper in the new Bank Windhoek branch that opened in Maerua Mall in February 2023.

They also received a commission from Namibia Asset Management for their annual report. In 2023, Omba Art Trust purchased a record number of baskets from Khwe weavers in Bwabwata National Park. Omba was also accepted for the 17th time to participate in the International Folk Art Market in Sante Fe, USA. This is a juried market for the best folk art in the world.

The Trust aims to increase turnover, production capacity and product development within selected communities. The organisation also hopes to strengthen its balance sheet and improve systems efficiency.

"We are women who live on a resettlement farm far away from town. Life is difficult, and there are no jobs. It is just Omba that is holding us together. With their help, we can care for our children and our families. Omba is the only project in Drimiopsis. Today, I have a house."

Business Box Namibia is an entrepreneurial hub that uplifts aspiring entrepreneurs by providing professional coaching and training, helping people to build businesses and create jobs. The initiative was started in Swakopmund as part of the MTC's Dome vision to unlock the potential of Namibia's youth through sports and entrepreneurship training programmes to help aspirant entrepreneurs, small business owners and previously unsuccessful businesses to become profitable and understand their role as entrepreneurs.

The Capricorn Foundation partnered with Business Box Namibia to expand the Business Box initiative to Windhoek.

Key achievements for 2023 are reshaping how people think about entrepreneurship and that three programme participants have begun and are building businesses.

Business Box Namibia aims to have at least 12 sites around Namibia by the end of 2023. The organisation hopes to build and grow the entrepreneurial movement in Windhoek by empowering people to develop their own businesses and careers.

Out of this group of 58 Entrepreneurs that were coached since the start of the Windhoek Business Box, 11 entrepreneurs have started their businesses. We continue to work with them and those working to turn their ideas and concepts into businesses.

Business Box Windhoek also partnered with the Capricorn Foundation on the Food Waste Challenge by providing mentoring and coaching to the top five finalists for the final round of judging, held in June 2023.

Sixteen years ago, MSR (Men on the Side of the Road) was created to assist job seekers sitting on the side of the road waiting to find work. Bank Windhoek has been supporting MSR since its establishment.

Upon registering as a member of MSR, job seekers undergo a two-day training programme to learn communication skills, prepare CVs and understand interview skills, general work conduct and financial management. MSR members can access job application assistance, training, and job opportunities.

MSR currently has 2,345 registered members in Windhoek, Swakopmund and Walvis Bay. It connected 263 people to full-time jobs, 1,440 temporary employment and 331 part-time job opportunities since 2007. Over the last year, MSR opened a new office in Walvis Bay, trained 88 people in entrepreneurship and facilitated a furniture refurbishment workshop funded by the Foundation.

MSR hopes to register 300 new unemployed people as members, train 300 people in life skills and financial literacy, connect 100 people to part-time, temporary or full-time employment, register 50 people for vocational training and train 60 people in entrepreneurship.

The Dreams Programme focuses on empowering young women to make better decisions. This prioritises economic strengthening interventions for young women and adolescent girls to decrease their reliance on male partners and strengthen their power in relationships.

According to UNAIDS data, about 220,000 Namibians live with HIV; of this, about 130,000 are female. The Dreams Programme aims to prevent new HIV infections among adolescent girls and young women and lessen the impact of HIV on vulnerable children.

The project provides young females with economic opportunities through school re-enrolment, entrepreneurship, and wage employment. An example of this is four young women who are participants of the programme who took part in an internship at a woodwork workshop in Katima Mulilo, Zambezi, after completing a six-month training in joinery and cabinet making.

In partnership with the Foundation, the Dreams Programme provided 26 young women with business start-up kits. The young women have received financial literacy training, life skills, job preparation training, vocational training in electrical skills and workplace-focused social skills. They will also be linked to mentored internships and receive coaching in job-seeking and entrepreneurship for a period of six months.

Since launching in 2020, the Dreams Programme has sponsored vocational opportunities for 1,091 young women of this number, 162 have been offered mentored internships, 248 have been linked to job placements and 426 have been provided with business start-up kits.



"During the vocational training, the course focused mostly on crafting smaller wooden items, or using manual machinery and tools to complete tasks, whereas during this internship we have been taught to make large items such as beds, tables, and doors and how to use power tools to complete these bigger jobs.

We have also learnt how to up-cycle readily available and cheap materials and turn them into furniture such as couches and chairs."

According to the 2022 Global Hunger Index, Namibia suffers from a severe hunger level, ranking 78th out of 116 countries. Trading Economics global macro models and analysis indicated Namibia's unemployment rate is around 22%. The Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge was launched in June 2022 as the Foundation's first signature project. The project called for innovative ideas to reduce food waste in the country.

Phase one of the Food Waste Challenge saw 101 submissions that focused on ideas on how to reduce food waste in Namibia. A cash prize of N\$100,000 was awarded to the 2022 Food Waste Challenge winner, Sara Ekondo, from Awana Foods based in Oshakati. Her idea to reduce food waste was based on lengthening the shelf-life of produce, such as turning tomatoes into tomato sauce.

Phase two of the Food Waste Challenge commenced in April 2023 in partnership with Gondwana Collection, Synergi Marketing and Business Box Namibia. Phase two focused on reducing food waste and creating employment through social enterprises. A total of 152 submissions were received by May 2023. After an internal and external judging process, the top five finalists were selected and then mentored and coached by Business Box, a Capricorn Foundation beneficiary, followed by the "Eagles Den" judging event with a live audience, where their ideas were presented.

The top five entrants presented the following ideas:

- > The Impact Tank Analysis Foundation from Windhoek proposed a business idea of composting food waste at the household level, retail establishments and the food service industry in Namibia using the iCompost technology that composts organic waste in six hours.
- > SuperFly Bio Converters CC from Windhoek focuses on sustainability, including food waste recycling, sustainable insect protein products and natural fertiliser.
- > Ndinandali Farm operating in Opuwo, developed a unique approach to produce to preserve the nutritional value of fresh produce while extending its shelf life.
- > Nova Research Consultancy from Walvis Bay seeks to reduce hunger and create employment opportunities by using seafood waste like heads and livers to produce food products for human consumption.
- > Eagle Foodhub App from Rundu offers an app to empower restaurants, shops and individuals to donate surplus food through their app and web platform, connecting them with food shelters and orphanages.

Ndasilohenda Katangolo-Nakashwa of Ndinandali farm, operating in Opuwo, was announced as the overall winner in July 2023. Katangolo-Nakashwa received a cash prize of N\$100,000 from the Capricorn Foundation, N\$50,000 branding and marketing package from Synergi Marketing and three months business coaching from Business Box Namibia.

One Economy Foundation #BeFree Project

Social welfare organisation One Economy Foundation defines itself as a bridge to socioeconomic opportunity, building an economy of equality and shared prosperity. Its signature project is the #BeFree Movement, a platform that enables young people to have honest and robust dialogue and share information on issues affecting the youth.

Its #BeFree Youth Campus in Windhoek seeks to address social inequalities that threaten youth development. This includes providing them with psychosocial support, legal and criminal justice system guidance, sexual reproductive health services, entrepreneurial programming, skills development, life skills, adolescent-friendly entertainment, and other critical services.

As a partner, the Foundation has supported One Economy Foundation in constructing a science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) centre at the campus. The centre includes a digital and physical library.

In the last year, One Economy expanded entrepreneurship programming, training more than 200 young entrepreneurs across five regions.

The Response Action Based Organisation was developed in reaction to increased violent crimes, abuse, neglect, and suicide attempts in Namihia

This initiative aims to reduce violence by creating awareness through media campaigns, roadshows and door-to-door discussions.

In the past year, the organisation focused on ensuring children are provided for, facilitating community engagements, soup kitchens and, helping as many households as possible, and preventing suicide, violence occasioned by hunger and depression.

Founder Zachary Itodo says, "The most rewarding is seeing the positive impact in the community knowing that we put smiles on the many and made a difference".

Since 2009, Imago Dei has acted as a bridge between the community of means and the community of needs, bringing basic resources and support to vulnerable communities.

Imago Dei provides support to communities by providing existing projects with financial support. The organisation also provides food, clothing, toiletries, and physical support for community projects.

The organisation worked closely with community members through the Dutch Reformed Eros Church in Windhoek to connect with various projects and provide financial assistance.

The following projects benefited from the Capricorn Foundation's partnership with Imago Dei:

Hope for Life Foundation (Windhoek)

Hope for Life Foundation is a Christian, non-denominational, non-profit institution providing various services. The foundation has a company registration number, 2018/2969, and is a registered Welfare Organisation with the Ministry of Health (WO 481). The current primary focus is on providing counselling, support and training to women and men facing unplanned pregnancies in Namibia. The centre also offers economic upliftment opportunities for women through small Business Starter Packs and mentoring.

Burgershoek Children Community Project (Rehoboth)

Burgershoek Children Community Project was established in June 2021 to address the needs of vulnerable children living in the Burgershoek area, an informal settlement in Block G in Rehoboth. This project operates holistically and aims to provide psychosocial support to 140 children in the area. They focus on all the needs of children, including their physical, emotional, spiritual mental health, educational and social needs.





Imago Dei continued

Grace Welfare Project (Windhoek)

The Grace Welfare Project is a non-profit community-based project which reaches out to the marginalised people in different communities by contributing towards their basic livelihood and attending to their psychosocial needs. The Grace Project distributes food parcels to pensioners every third Thursday of every month at the Khomas Community Church in Khomasdal. During this session, the elderly also receive a church service and a cooked meal. Currently, 180 households benefit from this aid. The project also strives to provide basic necessities such as clothes and blankets if possible.

Namibia Christian Women Aid Society (Windhoek)

This organisation was established in 1976 as a registered Welfare Organisation (W.O.5) to care for elderly people. All members work voluntarily and receive no remuneration. Their vision is to transform the lives of the elderly. They are mainly dependent on donations for existence and receive donations from churches and businesses to fulfil the caring needs of the elderly. Funds requested will be spent on purchasing food items to fill their food parcels with dried foods, including maize meal, pasta, rice, soup powder, coffee, and sugar. They currently provide food parcels to 450 pensioners monthly.

Family of Hope Services (Windhoek)

Family of Hope Services provides empowering and capacity-building programme to bring socioeconomic stability to children, youth and their families living in the Havana community. Activities include a remedial school programme, afterschool programme, food & nutrition, and psychosocial support. Through life skills and trauma counselling, the centre aims to restore hope, joy and dignity to children and young people. 145 children are schooling at the Centre and an additional 255 from the community are offered meals on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

In a world where young women are confronted with identity crises and gender inequality in the home, workplace and communities, organisations such as Dear Girl Namibia ("DGN") inspires young girls not just to accept life as it is but to strive for a more dignified future to gain freedom.

DGN provides a safe space for young women through its healing seminars where women and young girls in communities are offered a platform to share their stories, past traumas, and fears and are empowered to deal with them.

To bring in a balance in the service of DGN, not only does DGN deals with the mind and heart transformation, however it also provides physical needs by distributing reusable sanitary pads to various regions across Namibia while creating awareness about menstrual hygiene and period poverty, guiding, and supporting young women in their personal and professional development spheres through its teaching, training manuals, equipping and mentorship programmes.

With the privilege of the funding received by the Capricorn Foundation in 2023, 500 girls from three schools benefited from the project, namely Neyuva and Ndiyona Secondary School in Kavango, De Palm Secondary School in Erongo and Olukupa Combined School in Ohangwena Region. Each girl also received a Dear Girl Booklet, which was designed and printed by the Capricorn Foundation.

Thousands of Namibians are subjected to hunger daily, this includes school learners who attend classes on an empty stomach every day.

Gondwana Care Trust, through the MealForTwo programme, strives to be a link between financial contributions, largely through NGOs and Namibian organisations that use food donations and the hungry Namibians. This includes people at old-age homes, homeless people, school children and those in after-school care. This is achieved through the trust's MealsForTwo Programme, established in 2019.

In 2023, four additional beneficiary organisations joined the project bringing the number of organisations assisted with meals to 29. More than 300,000 meals were provided to children through the programme. Gondwana Care Trust hopes to reach more beneficiaries for the project by expanding into other regions in Namibia.

The Daily Bread Feeding Scheme prepares warm and nutritious meals for people in need in the Walvis Bay area. At the start of the programme in 2022, Daily Bread Feeding Scheme fed about 200 people, and that number has since, more than doubled.

In 2023, the scheme helped unemployed young people find work and collect second-hand clothing. It costs the Daily Bread scheme approximately N\$7,000 to feed over 500 people each Friday. This has been possible with the support of external partners, including the Foundation, who committed to the project for a period of six months. The scheme hopes to increase the number of meals from one to three per week.

Hands of Hope helps vulnerable communities across Namibia by equipping, educating and guiding community members towards a better future. Hands of Hope contributes to the well-being of these communities by creating structures that can be used as schools, churches or feeding homes, as well as setting up water tanks for clean water or irrigation systems for planting sustainable produce.

The Capricorn Foundation supported the Hands of Hope Project to set up shelter and provide clean drinking water through a well and irrigation system for the community water in Divundu Village, Kavango East. In addition, the identified community members received 'Foundations for Farming' training to become self-sustainable and produce their own vegetables.

Over the past year, Happy Land focused on supplying children with educational resources including stationery, school uniforms and other school supplies. The organisation also assisted young people to pursue their tertiary education.

Happy Land is determined to provide quality education, food supply and decent shelter to vulnerable children and afford them opportunities to visit places outside of Henties Bay.

The Foundation's support was earmarked towards food support for a period of one year.

Food and nutrition security is a key focus for the Foundation. In June 2023, the Foundation bought 10 tons of butternut valued at N\$100,000 to distribute to vulnerable communities across Namibia. The butternuts were purchased from the Mariental Horticulture Pilot Project, which was established in 2022 as a collaboration between the government of Namibia and the Namibian Correctional Service in partnership with the WFP, IFARMS, and the Lithon Group. The project aims to support healthy and nutritious diets and address rural transformation, food production, offender skill development, social cohesion, and environmental rehabilitation.

The butternuts were distributed to 80 organisations across 10 regions in Namibia. Capricorn Foundation distributed 2.7 tons of butternut to vulnerable orphans and communities experiencing food insecurity and malnutrition. Our CSR partner Imago Dei helped us to identify suitable recipients within these communities.

Our CSR partner, Lithon Foundation, coordinated the distribution of the rest of the Foundation's butternut contribution, about seven tons, to various towns and regions in Namibia. We were also assisted by Imago Dei, Gondwana Care Trust, On Time Couriers, Hardap Couriers and several individuals to transport and distribute the butternuts across the regions.

"As Connectors of Positive Change, we find it crucial to collaborate with like-minded organisations to engage and seek various pathways toward transforming food insecurity in Namibia, and this is another opportunity for us to do so. We are proud of our partnership with WFP and the Lithon Foundation to ensure that these butternuts are not wasted and reach the most vulnerable communities across Namibia."

Namibia Heart Foundation

As the number of people living with heart disease rises in Namibia, the Namibia Heart Foundation ("NHF") seeks to raise awareness about the disease and encourage people to develop heart-healthy habits.

The NHF brings this health issue to light by raising funds to support people living with heart disease and networking with heart disease practitioners. It seeks to make a measurable difference in stopping Namibians from dying prematurely from cardiovascular diseases and strokes by equipping them with the appropriate life-saving information and encouraging them to adopt healthy lifestyles.

Over the last year, the NHF was committed to raising awareness about heart disease and living a healthy lifestyle through initiatives such as the Heart Patient Breakfast Day, delivering dry food parcels to child and adult heart patients and the 2022 International Heart Summit of African Heart Network. The NHF was able to host this summit with the help of the Capricorn Foundation.

In 2024, the NHF will focus on educating people on heart disease, pre and post-operative trauma counselling, increasing fundraising and networking with heart specialists, hospital cardiac units and affiliated professionals such as dieticians and biokineticists.

Namibia Children's Heart Trust was founded by paediatric cardiologist Dr Fenny Shidhika in 2022 to ensure that children born with congenital heart diseases have access to affordable, timely and safe care, regardless of their socioeconomic status.

In 2023, Namibia Children's Heart Trust facilitated medical, transcatheter and surgical management of almost 200 patients born with congenital heart disease. The Foundation has supported the organisation by funding its cardiac theatre supporting the Trust's quest to perform 150 to 200 transcatheter and surgical procedures in 2023.

The Trust aims to perform about 100 cardiac scans on pregnant women through a newly established foetal-maternal clinic.

Capacity Grow is a Windhoek-based psychology consultancy that offers talent management solutions across the employee lifecycle. The firm focuses on soft skills, including psychometric assessment, training facilitation, custom soft skills training development, coaching and counselling.

During 2023, Capacity Grow Namibia collaborated with Capricorn Foundation on three projects:

- > Tomorrow's Leaders Today Leadership: A two-day training course for learner representative councils (one head boy and one head girl per school) from ten high schools in Windhoek. The training focused on building their leadership and communication skills.
- > **Emotional Intelligence Training for Community Leaders:** 20 leaders could attend the two-day workshop and benefit from the following, growing insight into the laws that impact their thought life and how they engage with their environment and communities that they support, as well as how to deal with challenging situations and build a healthy community.
- > Educating communities on the impact of GBV and on healthy ways to manage emotions: The project educated 600 community members and visited three schools, Jan Mohr Secondary School; Highline Primary School and; Hillside Secondary School, to educate on the impact of Gender-based Violence and healthy ways to manage emotions and deal with conflict. The project also coordinated with Zackary Itodo of the Response Action Based Organisation, who works with communities on GBV cases and child neglect.

Through its work over the past year, Capacity Grow Namibia has equipped individuals with tools on how to manage emotions, approach difficult conversations in a healthy way, manage conflict and be assertive.

The Ministry of Health and Social Services partnered with organisations such as the Foundation to help Namibians who are living with visual impairment. This included running eye campaigns across rural communities.

The project provides needed equipment to public eye clinics across Namibia to treat patients and help cure preventable blindness. By the end of 2023, the Ministry would have completed five campaigns and operated on 2,000 patients.

With the help of the Foundation, the Ministry purchased four new slit lamps, which are used to examine and treat visual problems.

Elephants, Rhinos & People Namibia

Launched in 2021, Elephants, Rhinos & People Namibia ("ERP Namibia") is a non-profit organisation which focuses on preserving and protecting southern Africa's wild elephants and rhinos while addressing rural poverty alleviation.

ERP Namibia partnered with the Foundation for its #BIKES4ERP initiative, which provides bicycles to less fortunate school pupils, who often walk up to 20 km every day in their commute to school.

ERP Namibia aims to provide at least 100 children in rural Namibia with a bicycle, helmet, and maintenance kit through this project. Should there be students showing adequate potential, the ERP will provide opportunities for further career developments within the ERP Group internationally, based on specific skill sets of students and on the ERP's cost.

"#BIKES4ERP recognises that in these communities, bicycles produce immediate benefits. Riding a bike decreases the overall impact of the commute, which means students arrive at school better able to concentrate and their attendance rate improves."

Due to the lack of electricity, thousands of Namibian learners in rural areas and informal settlements are forced to study at home using candlelight or paraffin lamps. Edu-light addresses the social challenge of energy poverty for learners by providing them with solar lights.

Greenville Solar powers the Edu-Light initiative, and Edu-Light's 14 agents are tasked with identifying the relevant schools and delivering the lights in the regions.

The solar lights help learners to increase their productivity while studying or doing their homework at night, which improves their overall academic performance. The initiative also aims to address health and safety issues such as fire risk and respiratory problems due to toxic emissions.

According to Edu-Light, a family of five can spend about N\$30 to N\$40 on candles per week and providing them with one solar light can help them save up to N\$1,920 a year.

Edu-Light continues to collaborate with the Foundation and other partners to ensure that learners and households have access to sustainable energy. Two remote schools outside of Opuwo, Havana Secondary School in Windhoek, learners from the informal settlement of Omaruru and Usakos, and Onehanga Primary School in the Okongo Circuit are the beneficiaries of the initiative this year.

In 2024, Edu-Light will launch a programme called Food for Education which will see Edu-Light work closely with the parents of learners to ensure that the issue of hunger among learners is addressed.

"After the handover at Eenhana Secondary School, it is worth mentioning that we have seen improvement in the grade 11 results, in 6 out of the 11 subjects compared to the 2021 results. Additionally, the number of learners qualifying for NSSC and AS has increased from 23 in 2021 to 34 in 2022."

Uganda came out victorious, while the host country came in second place.

The league seeks to enhance the role of sports among young people and promote women in sports. The league is endorsed by the Namibia School Sports Union.

Earth Day: Changemakers sow seeds of Positive Change

Access to nutritional food is one of the biggest challenges that confront disadvantaged families and at-risk communities across Namibia

In celebration of International Earth Day, the Changemaker Programme and Christ Hope International, a beneficiary of the Capricorn Foundation, teamed up in April 2023 to ensure that orphaned and vulnerable children at the centre and their families are supported to have access to healthy, nutrient-dense, and low-cost fruits and vegetables.

With the help of 40 Changemaker volunteers, the centre planted vegetable gardens that will produce onions, cabbage, spinach, and other vegetables that will benefit 90 children and 45 families in the Okahandja community in Otjozondjupa Region.

About 200 grade 10 and 11 learners benefited from the donation of textbooks and stationery relevant learning material.

Ahead of the 2022 festive season, Changemaker volunteers participated in various Christmas drives in the Oshana, Khomas and Hardap regions during December 2022. 55 Changemakers volunteered to put smiles on the faces of over 650 people by knitting dolls, donating and serving food, and reading to children at Gemma Kindergarten, Amos Meerkat Syllabus Project, Central Hospital Children's Cancer Ward, and URC Mariental Soup Kitchen in preparation for the holiday season.







Celebrating community heroes on Heroes' Day

As Namibia celebrated Heroes' Day on 26 August 2022, Changemakers joined Imago Dei, a partner of the Capricorn Foundation, and honoured 40 community heroes, project leaders and volunteers from various community projects and centres across Namibia. The event was attended by community leaders from various organisations ranging from organisations that support differently abled children to feeding homes and ECD centres.

Sanitary Pads Drive: International Day of the Girl Child

International Day of the Girl Child, celebrated on 11 October, sheds light on the social ills and challenges facing girls. One of these challenges is period poverty and menstrual hygiene.

The Changemakers Programme partnered with Imago Dei, a partner of the Capricorn Foundation, to distribute sanitary pads and mini wipes to girls in vulnerable communities in Windhoek, Khomas and Rehoboth, Hardap. With the help of employees, a total of 16,500 sanitary pads were collected, ensuring that 70 high school girls from orphanages and homes in the Khomas and Hardap regions have a year-long supply of sanitary pads.

Bank Windhoek Cancer Apple Project

Over the last 23 years, The Cancer Association of Namibia and Bank Windhoek have partnered on the Bank Windhoek Cancer Apple Project.

The project seeks to create cancer awareness and educate Namibians on the importance of regular screening for potential detection.

Since 2000, the project has raised N\$33 million for the Cancer Association of Namibia. The funds raised through the project go towards the national outreach campaign that provides free screening and testing to Namibians.

All Bank Windhoek employees have played a significant role in the project. 150 representatives were mobilised to coordinate the project for their respective branches and departments.

The initiative was also established to provide drought relief to affected community members in the Kunene Region.

The project sought to help vulnerable community members who, as a result of the flood and drought, could not live off the land.

The project, which started in July 2023, is expected to feed about 1,500 learners daily.

Grade Four Mathematics Initiative

Education was one of the key focus areas for Bank Windhoek in 2023. That is why the Bank partnered with the Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture and the Capricorn Foundation to launch the Grade Four Mathematics Initiative across nine regions in Namibia.

The initiative equips grade four mathematics teachers with unique teaching techniques and skills, creating a lasting impact in the lives of learners.

About 70% of teachers who attended the workshop showed improvement in their knowledge, skills, and confidence in teaching mathematics after the intervention from the workshop. It also created a networking opportunity for teachers to share skills.













Bank Gaborone is one of the leading banks in Botswana, offering financial services across 12 branches over the last 17 years. The CSR focus areas for 2023 are premised on the bank's Corporate Social Responsibility Policy to ensure that resources are invested in an impactful and sustainable manner.

Bank Gaborone continued to play a big role in promoting health amongst staff and customers, and participated in the fight against Breast Cancer. Apart from its contribution to the Capricorn Foundation, Entrepo manages its own CSR portfolio. The flagship project of Entrepo is the support to children with disabilities and their families and raising awareness about disabilities.

In 2023, Entrepo contributed N\$539,000 to Side-by-Side Early Intervention Centre, a Windhoek-based rehabilitation haven for children with disabilities and their families, providing training to children, parents, caregivers and healthcare professionals. The impact of the Side-by-Side Early Intervention Centre on the community at large is, among many others, as follows:

- > 54 children receive one-on-one therapy weekly, while their parents receive training
- > 15 children are in a preschool and daycare where they are prepped for independence and school
- > 10 grade 1 2 learners are in a home-schooling programme where they are learning to read and write
